

After a period of extremely restricted entry to Timor for outsiders, since the 1975 Indonesian invasion of the island, Mr Whitlam was secretly flown into East Timor by an Indonesian Government agency earlier this week.

Mr Whitlam is accompanied on the visit by the foreign editor of the 'Sydney Morning Herald', Mr Peter Hastings.

Mr Whitlam has been the centre of a fierce controversy over his role in the Indonesian invasion of Timor.

According to the former Secretary of Foreign Affairs, Mr Allan Renoul, Mr Whitlam told the Indonesian President, Mr Saharto at a meeting in Indonesia in September 1975, that it was "desirable" that East Timor be integrated with Indonesia.

The chairman of the Australian Council for Overseas Aid, Mr Richard Alston, yesterday criticised Mr Whitlam's visit, saying: "To confine entry only to known Indonesian apologists and not independent observers would be a blatant double standard which can only lend further credence to persistent reports of continuing widespread famine and military repression in East Timor."

Mr Alston's attack is likely to strain further relations between Australia and Indonesia. The Australian Government has been trying to improve relations between the two countries over the past five years.

But criffcism of Indonesian

But criticism of Indonesian policies towards Timor by Australian organisations such as foreign aid agencies and Radio Australia — which the Indonesians say the Australian Government should silence — have thwarted the efforts of the Australian Government to patch up relations.

Although Mr Alston was geaking as the chairman of the id council, he is also the Victrian president of the Liberal arty. The Indonesian authorities are unlikely to accept that he is of speaking in a semi-official apacity. spe sid

According to an official of the adoresian Embassy in Canberra, for Whitlam is visiting East amor in a private capacity.
